World AIDS day

On the 1st of December IOP joined people all over the world in raising awareness about HIV/Aids.



The IOP-scouts contributed with several songs on the World Aids Day.

The IOP-girls sang their hearts out on an annual World Aids Day event in Kitowo village-Kilolo District. They also danced and performed a role play. Several organizations joined in, and the building was packed with people. The purpose of the event was to raise awareness about HIV/Aids and support those living with it, but also to remember those who have died from it.

-In IOP we deal with the impact of HIV/Aids every day in our work for orphans and most vulnerable children, Robert Mbungu, economic strengthening officer of IOP, says.

There are still many people suffering from HIV/Aids in Tanzania, and Iringa region has the highest HIV-rate in the whole country. Still, there are some highlights:

- The last few years have showed some improvement in this area, though Iringa is still on top of the list, Berit Skaare says. However, we are happy to have come to a point where we believe that most, if not all, people are informed about how HIV spreads. Through the last 5 years when IOP has been active in educating, counselling and testing, we have served about 70,000 people. We are happy to understand that stigma is not a problem as it was ten years ago, and that more and more people accept to test in order to know their status. People living with HIV are everywhere and in all walks of life. Several of our good employees are positive, as well as several of the girls at the Orphan Center. Of course the intense international education about HIV has brought great results.


