## CELEBRATIONS OF THE WOMEN'S DAY IN ILULA!

On March 6, women in Kilolo District celebrated International Women's Day in a vibrant event under the slogan "Women and Girls 2025: Let's Strengthen Justice, Equality, and Empowerment."

Although the day is nationally observed on March 8, Kilolo chose to mark it earlier with a series of engaging activities.

The celebration began in the morning with stakeholders setting up exhibition booths showcasing products such as liquid soaps, batik, beauty items, and handmade

baskets and IOP showcased the handmade crafts made by the young single mothers. Later the guests gathered for festivities featuring music and camaraderie. The program included introductory remarks by the Ilula Township Executive Officer (TEO) and a brief history of International Women's Day presented by the Kilolo District Community Development Officer. There were various topics presented that day including;

- Psychology and Gender: A speaker emphasized understanding societal and familial roles while highlighting the importance of mental health care for building safer communities.

- Nutrition: Guests were reminded of the role of proper nutrition in fostering stronger societies, particularly for children.

During the event there were awards that were presented to individuals and organizations excelling in community empowerment. The Ilula Orphan Program (IOP) received recognition for its impactful work empowering women. Additionally, a young mother from the IOP's project was honored for her entrepreneurial success, inspiring others to pursue business opportunities.

The guest of honor delivered a speech urging the protection of women's economic, political, and gender rights. She encouraged women to participate in upcoming elections and take leadership roles within families and communities. She also stressed reporting incidents of violence against women and children to authorities to ensure justice.

The event concluded with a call to action for collective advocacy toward gender equality and community development.

## THE INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY FORUM AT IOP!

In celebration of International Women's Day, the Ilula Orphan Program (IOP) hosted a forum that brought together a diverse group of participants, including staff from various IOP

departments, students and teachers from local schools, police representatives from the gender desk, young mothers, young peacemakers, volunteers, and community leaders. This inclusive event fostered discussions on pressing societal issues affecting both women and men.

The panel discussion served as an interactive platform for youth and

stakeholders to share their perspectives on this year's theme. Key topics included the meaning of gender equality, the current status of women and girls in society, and the importance of

inclusive empowerment that involves men as allies rather than sidelining them. Speakers emphasized the need for mutual respect, equitable opportunities, and the dismantling of harmful gender stereotypes within schools, families, and communities.

The local police force highlighted the critical role of the Gender and Children's Desk in addressing gender-based violence. They educated attendees on how to report such cases, follow up on them, and support victims through legal and psychosocial resources.

A standout moment was a speech by Ms. Berit, IOP's founder. As a trailblazing female leader, she underscored the importance of collaboration between men and women. She encouraged women to confidently leverage their skills

and voices to assume leadership roles and advocate for their rights while fostering respect and unity in society.

## **VOLUNTEER'S GOODBYE PARTY AT IOP!**

With heartfelt gratitude, the Ilula Orphan Program (IOP) bid farewell to dedicated volunteers—Doret Cornelissen, Inza Gast, Pia, and Charlotte—during a special ceremony in March 24th 2025. Staff, children, and young mothers gathered to express their appreciation for the volunteers' transformative work, which has profoundly impacted the organization's growth and the lives of IOP Beneficiaries.

The volunteers' efforts have been instrumental in advancing IOP's mission. By taking on critical

tasks—from supporting children to aiding educational projects—they enabled significant cost savings that would otherwise have been spent on hired labor. This efficiency allows IOP to allocate more resources directly to vulnerable children and community programs.

A standout contribution came from Doret Cornelissen (Netherlands), whose donation of 5,746,400 Tanzanian shillings has directly

supported the Ilula Orphan Home, Kids Corner Preschool, and Mama House. Also, another volunteer from the Netherlands Inza Gast donated more than 4,500,000/= that has supported different projects like the vulnerable families in Ilula that she visited, Center children, Youth Center and the IPVTC. Moreover, she has fundraised more (5500 Euro) that has been sent to IOP Netherlands to support more programs like the IOP Center and Chicken Project. This act of generosity underscores how volunteer involvement often extends beyond time and labor to include vital financial support for IOP's expanding initiatives.

During the ceremony, IOP's Managing Director highlighted the indispensable role of volunteers, noting that the organization's founder remains its "first volunteer." This spirit of selfless service continues to drive IOP's growth, particularly in education, healthcare, and sustainable community projects.

IOP invites others to follow this example by volunteering or donating to sustain its programs, including the Ilula Orphan Center, Sunflower Primary School where we need more dormitories also at the Lord's Hill secondary school where we also need more dormitories for the students. This support will enable us to construct more dormitories hence have more safe space for accommodating our students in the school.
